
et aside several hours to stroll round Art/London 90, which promises to be Britain's largest ever international contemporary art fair. It takes place at Olympia from 29 March to 1 April. Over 120 galleries from 16 countries are planning to show original paintings, sculpture, drawings, prints. Art/London is into its fifth year. Last time, ne 20,000 people visited, but then a hall as vast as Olympia would need many more than that to look crowded. For those taking part, it is a way of making contact with prospective clients as well as selling to known ones (one Cork Street gallery took £1.75m at the 1989 fair); for the general public it is an relaxed introduction to commercial galleries that can so often be intimidating.

The organisers of Art/London try to broaden the appeal as far as possible. As well as daily seminars (free once you are in), there are

trails for children aged 9 to 12, and a loan exhibition of 700 contemporary works collected by a Russian, Kolya Shchukin, whose father, Sergei, had an insatiable appetite for French avant-garde painting from Matisse to Picasso.

Prices will range from £50 to £250,000, but there is absolutely no obligation to buy. And admission for Independent readers is half the normal price (with the voucher below). As in previous years, the fair will recognise new talent with the 1990 British Airways New Artist Award, worth £10,000 in air travel to the winner. As an encouragement to Fair visitors wanting to start up a collection, there will be a section on works under the price of £1,000.
