

omputer games Play omputer games with your mates cross the world: US Baton technologies ave developed a modem (compatible with oth Megadrive and NES systems) that perits one-on-one link-ups via phone lines to onnect game players in different cities or puntries. The Teleplay System is vailable in e US this month for around \$90 with sci-fi noot-'em-up Terran Wars. Back in Britain, curently available on both Megadrive and SNES stems is the French cinematique game nother World. Asking you to free a scientist opped into a threatening alternate reality, the nema element is in the form of set animated equences over which you have no control but an trigger by reaching certain points. Visually ppealing, although play is difficult and requires demanding brain-logic that transcends the stinctive jump-'n'-shoot mindset of its conemporaries. For an unusual animal rights perpective, check the Megadrive's Rolo To The escue: a small Dumbo-styled elephant circus scapee whose ET-influenced mission is to 'go ome' and free a brace of furry friends from eir cages. Classic platform stuff but visually 's a total cute-out, with gameplay that emands both calculated thought and joyous omping, running and bouncing about. Tony

echno toy i-D's techno toy of the north is a CD created by Hex for the Philips D-i system. An eight track disc, eScape feares music from Irresistible Force, B12, oldcut and Eon with a visual dimension of omputer graphics. The product's main trength is its inter-reaction; achieved through ne CD-i's mouse which enables the ayer/user to change backgrounds, shift and vcle colours, wiggle graphics and cut the visus to the beats. "Philips have created some xtraordinary tech with the CD-i," explaines oldcut/Hex's Mat Black, "but they don't know hat to do with it and need us to develop a relvant application for the youth market." Black nticipates that they will develop similar interctive products for other CD Rom systems (like ne Sega-CD) and views eScape as just the rst in a new breed of hip techno software roducts. As he says, "this is modern art writen in code". Tony Marcus

berlin squat bars There is perhaps no more true expression of 'underground' than Berlin, east side. As the German government ply Berlin's squat community with legal contracts, hoping to persuade them to quit lucrative properties in the previously undesirable Mitte and Kreuzberg areas, the hardcore heels of the underground dig themselves deeper. The warped environment of squatted creative centre and bar Eimar (Rosenthaler Strasse) is just one example of a vibrant, imaginative and magical Berlin art-bar scene. Eimar worker Ben explains: "The Eimar is a never-ending experiment in possibilities. We bring together film, live music, sound system, slide and video projections, performance, sensory and interactive events, painting and sculpture. Change is the only constant thing. By squatting and remaining self-sufficient we don't have to conform." On a similar vibe is the strange, den-like Go-Go bar (Neune Schönhauser Strasse), run by performance group Dead Chickens, who exist by making and selling salvage sculptures and jewellery built from postreunification debris. Finding a seat in the Go-Go bar is a totally new experience: a bizarre arrangement of perches made from welded-together, sculpted metal, fluffy ladies' dressing stools and dentists' chairs, all positioned at different heights, and a worn velvet couch nailed halfway up the wall. Industrial and experimental music and videos contribute to a unique, surreal and enigmatic atmosphere. Karen Peet

Swinging '60s The Sixties Film Scene In London is a timely look back at how London became the movie mecca of the world in the '60s as directors like Truffaut, Kubrick and Polanski flocked to the city to make films; inspired by its reputation as the cultural capital of the decade.
